Call 811 Before You Dig

Did you know that every nine minutes an underground utility is damaged because someone didn't call 8-1-1 before digging? More than expensive damage to buried utility lines, digging without knowing where lines are located can result in injuries or even death.

Follow these steps before digging:

1. Notify your local one-call center (8-1-1) or make an online request at www.call811.com.
2. Wait at least two business days for utility operators to respond to your request.
3. Confirm that the utility operators have responded to your request by comparing the markers to the list of utilities the one-call center notified.
4. Respect the flag markers that serve as your guide throughout your project and are valid for 20 calendar days from the date the notice is made.
5. Dig carefully! Avoid digging near the flags (within 18"-24" on all sides). If that's not possible, consider moving your project to another part of your yard.

Planning to Build a New Grain Bin?

If you're considering a new grain bin this spring, remember that it's important to first contact Farmers Electric Cooperative.

Your cooperative will provide assistance in planning for a safe environment for everyone working and living around grain bins. The State of Iowa requires specific clearances for electric lines around grain bins, with different standards for those filled by portable and permanent augers, conveyors and elevators.


The drawings on this page show the specific clearances required for both scenarios. If you have any questions, please call Farmers at (800) 397-4821.

According to the Iowa Electric Safety Code found in Iowa Administrative Code Chapter 199 -- 25.2(3) b.: *An electric utility may refuse to provide electric service to any grain bin built near an existing electric line which does not provide the clearances required by the American National Standards Institute (ANSI)C2-2017 "National Electrical Safety Code," Rule 234F. This paragraph "b" shall apply only to grain bins loaded by portable augers, conveyors or elevators and built after September 9, 1992, or to grain bins loaded by permanently installed augers, conveyors, or elevator systems installed after December 24, 1997.* (As adopted by the Iowa Utilities Board)



This important program provides a toolkit of resources and ideas to help eliminate serious injuries and fatalities due to electrical contact and enhance co-op safety programs. As CEO, I was proud to sign my name to the pledge form demonstrating my - and our cooperative's - commitment to the program.

Being a lineman consistently ranks among the most dangerous occupations in the United States. We don't take our commitment to safety lightly and it's important that we resist becoming complacent in our efforts - whether during a simulation exercise or actually out in the field. Our linemen know they must be diligent every step of the way, both for themselves and their fellow workers.

Our office staff, too, benefit from understanding industry safety practices. While the linemen

have a much more rigorous safety training schedule due to the nature of their work, our employees participate in safety meetings to learn about things such as fire safety, storm safety, CPR, and more. These lessons are important to repeat time and again so if something tragic should happen, we can think and act quickly, calmly and without hesitation.

APRIL RECIPES: CHICKEN

Creamy Grape Salad

INGREDIENTS

- 1 pkg. (8 oz.) cream cheese, softened
- 1 c. sour cream
- 1/3 c. sugar
- 1 tsp. vanilla extract
- 4 c. seedless red grapes
- 4 c. seedless green grapes
- 4 c. seedless black (or blue) grapes
- 1/4 c. brown sugar
- 1/2 c. chopped pecans (or walnuts)

In a large bowl, beat cream cheese, sour cream, white sugar and vanilla with electric mixer until smooth. Gently fold in grapes until evenly coated. Cover the bowl with plastic wrap and refrigerate for at least an hour or overnight. Before serving, sprinkle with brown sugar and chopped pecans or walnuts.

Pea Salad

INGREDIENTS

- 8 slices bacon, cooked and chopped
 - 1 1/2 lb. frozen peas, thawed
 - 1/2 c. red onion
 - 1 c. mayonnaise
 - 1/4 tsp. black pepper
 - 1 T. sugar
 - 1/4 tsp. sea salt
 - 2 T. apple cider vinegar
 - 1 c. shredded cheddar cheese
- Mix together and chill.

SPRING CLEANING SAFETY TIPS

Don't rush because you're tired or in a hurry. Take a break, drink some water and rest periodically.

Don't carry too much stuff at once, particularly on stairs.

Use proper lifting technique to move large pieces of furniture and appliances: keep your back straight and lift with your legs.

Be safe while on ladders and stepstools. Have someone holding it steady, and don't lean too far to either side.

Keep stairs, landings, and walkways clear of boxes, bags and clutter.
