

Serve Up Fire Safety in the Kitchen

f you're doing more cooking at home these days, why not involve your family in some safety lessons around the kitchen? This year's Fire Prevention Week is Oct. 4-10 with the theme "Serve Up Fire Safety in the Kitchen" to remind everyone of the dangers that lurk in the most used room in the house.

According to the National Fire Protection Association, cooking is the leading cause of



home fire injuries in the United States, with almost half (44%) of all reported home fires starting in the kitchen. Two-thirds of home cooking fires are

started by the ignition of food or other cooking materials.

NFPA recommends the following tips to help

keep your family safe when cooking in the kitchen:

- Never leave cooking food unattended. Stay
 in the kitchen while you are frying, grilling
 or broiling. If you have to leave, even for a
 short time, turn off the stove.
- If you are simmering, baking, roasting, or boiling food, check it regularly, remain in the home while food is cooking, and use a timer to remind you that you're cooking.
- Always keep an oven mitt and pan lid nearby when you're cooking. If a small grease fire starts, slide the lid over the pan to smother the flame. Turn off the burner, and leave the pan covered until it is completely cool.
- Have a "kid-free zone" of at least 3 feet around the stove and areas where hot food or drink is prepared or carried.

Failure to notice overhead power lines could be a deadly oversight

With the arrival of harvest season, Farmers Electric wants to remind its members to "look up and live" when working around overhead power lines.

As farm operators move tall equipment back and forth from the fields, coming into contact with overhead power lines becomes a significant hazard. And even if direct contact isn't made, coming close can cause electricity to jump, or "arc" to the equipment.

As a best practice, make sure everyone who is working is aware of where power lines are and knows to take precautions. Use caution when raising augers or the bed of a grain truck wagon because it can be difficult to estimate distance and sometimes a power line is closer than it looks. In the event contact is made, remember to stay inside the equipment until help can arrive. Contact with power lines can result in serious or fatal accidents.

We love our farmers and want to keep them safe this harvest season. Remember to Look Up and Live during the fall harvest.

Pumpkin Sheet Cake with Butter Brown Frosting

Frosting

1/2 c. butter

1/4 c. milk

4 c. powdered sugar

2 tsp. vanilla extract

INGREDIENTS

1 (15 oz.) can pumpkin

2 c. granulated sugar

1 c. vegetable oil

4 eggs, lightly beaten

2 c. all-purpose flour

2 tsp. baking soda

1 1/2 tsp. cinnamon

1/2 tsp. salt

Preheat oven to 350°F. Spray a 12x17 jelly roll pan with non-stick cooking spray. Combine flour, baking soda, cinnamon, and the salt; set aside. In a mixing bowl,

beat together the pumpkin, sugar, and the oil. Add the eggs and mix well. Add dry ingredients to the pumpkin mixture and beat until well blended. Pour into the prepared pan. Bake for 20 to 25 minutes or until a toothpick inserted into the center comes out clean. Cool completely

Frosting: Stir together milk and vanilla and set aside. Add powdered sugar to a mixing bowl and set aside. Over medium heat, melt the butter stirring constantly. When it becomes very frothy and turns brown remove from the heat. Add the milk and the vanilla mixture to the powdered sugar. Add the browned butter. Mix with an electric mixer until well combined. Immediately spread on the cooled cake.

The Best Pumpkin Chocolate Chip Cookies

INGREDIENTS

1 c. pumpkin puree (canned)

1 c. granulated sugar

1/2 c. vegetable oil (can sub with canola oil)

1 large egg

1 T. pure vanilla extract

2 c. all-purpose flour

2 tsp. baking powder

1 tsp. ground cinnamon 1/2 tsp. pumpkin spice (add an

1/2 tsp. fine sea salt

1 tsp. baking soda (optional)

extra 1/2 tsp. if you like spice)

1 tsp. milk (optional)

1 1/2-2 c. chocolate chips

Pre-heat oven to 350°F. Line a baking sheet with parchment paper or a baking mat. Set aside. Combine pumpkin, sugar, vegetable oil, vanilla and egg in a large bowl. Mix until smooth. In a separate bowl, stir together flour, baking powder, ground cinnamon, pumpkin spice and salt. If you'd like a fluffier cookie, dissolve the baking soda with the milk and stir into the wet ingredients. Add flour



mixture to pumpkin mixture and mix just until combined. Finally, stir in chocolate chips and stir until combined. Drop cookies on by the spoonful about 2 inches apart. Add a few extra chocolate chips to the tops if desired. Bake for 10-11 minutes, or until a toothpick comes clean. Allow to cool 2 minutes and then transfer to a cooling rack.
