Use wool or rubber dryer balls in the clothes dryer to reduce drying time and static.

# Take Advantage of 2021 Rebates

ontrary to many investor-owned electric utilities, electric cooperatives like Farmers Electric want to help you save money by maximizing the efficiency of your home, appliances and other electronics. That's because we are not in the business of making a profit. Anything above and beyond our operating costs are given back to our members as capital credits.

If it's time to replace your water heater, upgrade your old appliances, or maximize the efficiency of your home, make sure to check out the incentives Farmers offers and save!

### NEW EQUIPMENT / APPLIANCE INCENTIVES – RESIDENTIAL (PARTIAL)

#### Air-Source Heat Pump, including mini-splits

- Cold Climate Heat Pump: \$400/ton
- Standard Air-Source Heat Pump: \$200/ton
- Hybrid Air-Source Heat Pump Bonus: \$200/ton
- ENERGY STAR Bonus: \$250/unit
- ENERGY STAR Central Air Conditioning: \$100/unit

### Indoor Air Quality

- Energy/Heat Recovery Ventilator: \$250/unit
- ENERGY STAR Clothes Washer: \$40/unit
- ENERGY STAR Electric Clothes Dryer: \$20/ unit

### **Outdoor Lighting**

All LED lighting fixtures must be ENERGY STAR or DesignLights Consortium<sup>™</sup> qualified.

Outdoor lighting must be dusk-to-dawn with no manual switches or motion sensors (no outdoor floods). Lighting fixture rebates cannot exceed 50% of costs. Household limit of \$600 annually.

- 20-34W: \$10/fixture
- 35-49W: \$20/fixture
- 50-74W: \$40/fixture
- 75-124W: \$50/fixture
- ≥ 125W: \$60/fixture

**Electric Vehicle Level II Charger:** The cooperative will rebate 50% of the installed cost, up to \$500, for Level II chargers requiring a 240/280 vote input supply. The primary charging location of the vehicle must be at the home address of the member served by Farmers.

### APPLIANCE RECYCLING: PULL THE PLUG

Call our toll-free Pull the Plug hotline at (855) 838-7817 to request collection and recycling of your old, working refrigerator, freezer or window air conditioner, up to three operable units per address. Pick up and recycling is done by the cooperative's contractor.

- Refrigerator: \$35/unit
- Freezer: \$25/unit
- Window Air Conditioner: \$25/unit

### WORD BANK:

- Open curtains and blinds during the day to allow sunlight in to warm your home.
- · Instead of turning up the thermostat, add more layers of clothing to keep your body warm.
- If you have a fireplace, ask an adult to close the flue when a fire is not burning.
- Unplug chargers when they're not in use. They consume energy even when they're not charging phones and other devices.
- Ask an adult to check the air filter for your home's heating and cooling system. Filters should be replaced regularly to help the system run more efficiently.
- Always turn off lights when you leave a room.

### Winter Safety

As winter rolls on in Iowa, many of us find that February is the month to hunker down, wait out the cold, and dream of warmer temperatures coming right around the corner.

Until then, however, keeping your family safe during these cold and snowy months is a must. Here are a few safety reminders to help combat the worst of winter's fury.

Keep a hard copy of emergency contacts and important numbers. To avoid being completely isolated and vulnerable in the event you experience a power outage at home, keep an up-to-date physical document of emergency contacts and other important numbers that you can locate, even in the dark.

Don't wear cotton if you're planning to spend time outdoors. The main reason for this is cotton absorbs moisture which can work against your natural body heat. Opt instead for fabrics like wool, silk or polypropylene for inner layers.

Know your weather-related vocabulary. Having a grasp on what certain winter weather terms mean can help you prepare accordingly.

Avoid alcohol. Despite that warm feeling we think we get from our favorite adult beverages, the intoxicant actually lowers your body's core temperature.

Unplug your space heater when not in use. While space heaters can help us feel cozy at home, they can also be a fire hazard. The best way to avoid risk is to unplug the space heater when not in the room. Not only will you save money from not heating up an empty room, but you'll also mitigate the risk of it overheating or malfunctioning potentially causing a fire.

### Layered Fridge Brownies

### INGREDIENTS

 box brownie mix
oz. cream cheese
1/2 c. powdered sugar
2 - 8 oz. container whipped topping (such as Cool Whip<sup>®</sup>)
2 - 5.9 oz. packages instant

chocolate pudding 3 c. milk

Make brownies according to box directions for a 9x13 pan and let cool. With electric mixer, beat cream cheese and powdered sugar. Fold in all of whipped topping and spread over brownies. Combine pudding and milk and prepare according to package directions. Spread evenly over layer 2 and chill in fridge. Top with second container of whipped topping. You can also add fun stuff to the top such as chocolate sauce or chocolate curls or change up the flavor of the pudding.

2 c. sugar
1/2 c. milk
1 tsp. vanilla

Combine butter, sugar, milk and cocoa in medium saucepan over medium heat. Stir constantly until mixture comes to a full boil; remove from heat. Remove from heat and add remaining ingredients and mix well. Drop by teaspoonfuls onto waxed paper. Chill until firm.
