Energy Efficiency Tip of the Month

Even in the summer months, adding insulation to your attic can keep your home more comfortable and save energy used by your cooling system. If you can't see any floor joists above the insulation, you likely have enough. Attic insulation should be evenly distributed with no low spots. Make sure the areas along the eaves are adequately covered.

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

The credential recognizes co-op board members who are committed to advancing their knowledge and performing their fiduciary duty to the best of their ability. The Director Gold Certificate is the highest achievement for an electric cooperative board member.

For a director to earn the Director Gold certificate, they must have already earned the Credentialed Cooperative Director and Board Leadership certificates. Director Gold includes a continuing education requirement to maintain their Director Gold status.

NRECA represents more than 900 electric cooperatives, which provide electric service to more than 42 million people in 47 states.

Restoring Your Power Safely & Efficiently

Your cooperative does its best to avoid them, but there's no way around it: power outages occasionally happen. Now that we're in the height of spring storm season, I wanted to take a moment to explain our process for restoring your power after an outage.

As soon as it is safe to do so, our line crews begin by repairing power lines and equipment that will restore power to the greatest number of people in the shortest time possible. This means working on our larger main distribution lines that service many homes and businesses. Then, they work on tap lines, which deliver power to transformers that are either mounted on utility poles or placed on pads (for underground service). Finally, individual service lines that run between these transformers and your home are repaired.

At any given time, the cooperative maintains an inventory of utility poles, transformers

and other equipment so that we can get to work quickly. When widespread outages occur, multiple crews will be in the field simultaneously working to repair damage at multiple locations. We also coordinate with nearby co-ops to bring in additional crews when necessary.

As a co-op member, you can help us pinpoint outages. After you verify the outage is not limited to just your home, don't assume a neighbor has reported it. The quickest way to report an outage is by calling our outage reporting number at (800) 397-4821. And, we will provide updates on power restoration efforts on our Facebook page.

Mother Nature can be unpredictable, but as a member of Farmers Electric, you can feel confident knowing we're standing by, ready to restore power as quickly and safely as possible.

Add a Safety Focus to Spring Planting

Being prepared for medical emergencies and knowing the basics of first response can help minimize the extent of injuries during the busy spring planting season. Preparation includes having the right materials available. Keep in mind the following tips as you put together your farm emergency/first aid kit:

- 1. Consider developing several first aid kits** specific to the hazards, area and potential injury. A first aid kit in the barn may look different than one on the tractor.
- 2. Make sure your emergency kit contains personal medical information** and supplies for those with special medical conditions, such as allergies. The names and phone numbers of family doctors should be included.

3. Keep a card with written directions about how to get to the farmstead, field or work area in each kit. This will help save time explaining the location to 911 emergency operators.

4. Check kit every three months; inspect for expired supplies. Replace items that are dusty and make sure supplies fit the season.

5. Pack a Red Cross manual or first aid chart. This information is invaluable during a crisis when it's difficult to think clearly. First aid charts and Red Cross manuals list necessary steps to care for victims of various events, such as drowning, shock, fractures, or burns, and how to avoid additional injury.

6. Label all kits clearly. Store in a large nylon travel or sports bag with a visible label.

- 1lb. 85% ground beef
- 1 onion, finely chopped
- 1 beef bouillon cube
- 1/2 c. water
- Black pepper (to taste)
- 1 1/2 T. soy sauce
- 1 1/2 T. A.1. steak sauce
- 4-5 buns
- Softened butter
