Chocolate Caramel Bars

40 light caramels 2/3 c. evaporated milk, divided

1 pkg. chocolate cake mix

1/2 c. softened margarine

1 1/2 c. chocolate chips

1 c. chopped walnuts (optional)

In microwave, melt caramels and 1/3 c. evaporated milk. Stir after each minute until melted. Set aside. Grease and flour 9x13 cake pan. In a bowl, combine dry cake mix, margarine, 1/3 c. evaporated milk and nuts (optional). Stir with a fork until dough holds together. Press 2/3 of the dough into pan. Flour fingers to keep dough from sticking. Bake at 350 degrees for six minutes. Sprinkle chocolate chips over partially baked crust and spread caramel mixture over chips. Crumble remaining dough over caramel mixture. Bake 15-18 minutes longer. Cool and cut.

Frosted Brownie Cookies

3/4 c. vegetable oil 2 c. sugar 2/3 c. unsweetened cocoa powder 2 c. all-purpose flour 2 tsp. baking powder 4 eggs 2 tsp. vanilla extract



In small bowl, whisk together flour and baking powder. In large bowl, combine oil, sugar, cocoa, then add eggs one at a time, mixing well between each addition. Add vanilla. Slowly add flour mixture and mix until just combined. Use medium scooper to scoop dough and place on parchment paper. Bake 12-15 minutes at 350 degrees. Cool a few minutes on pan then move to cooling rack. Once cooled, add frosting.

FROSTING:

2 oz. unsweetened baking	1 tsp. vanilla
chocolate	4-5 T. heavy cream
4 T. unsalted butter	2 c. powdered sugar

In small saucepan, melt chocolate and butter on medium heat. Once melted, cool for 15 minutes. Using a stand mixer, combine cooled chocolate, vanilla, and heavy cream and mix well. Add powdered sugar and mix thoroughly. If crumbly, add more heavy cream. Spread on cooled cookies and set aside to allow frosting to harden a little bit. Store in airtight container at room temperature or freeze between sheets of wax paper.
